
Saving lives and second chances

PROCEDURE

Microchips: Permanent identification ensures that animals can be reunited with their owners faster, reducing stress for both animals and humans.

Vaccinations: Viruses such as cat flu and parvovirus can be deadly and are easily spread. Regular vaccinations help keep animals healthy and happy.

Desexing: Preventing unwanted litters addresses one of the major reasons animals are surrendered to shelters, or dumped and left to die.

Dentals: Prevention is better than cure. Dental treatment can help stop a range of serious illnesses developing in all kinds of animals.

X-Rays: Relief from suffering is paramount at RSPCA NSW. Our high-end diagnostic equipment helps us to identify and treat injuries quickly and effectively.

Become a Guardian Angel this Christmas and watch over one of the thousands of animals spending the festive season at an RSPCA shelter.


Your donation can make a real difference: you can help to fill tummies, provide safe, warm beds, and generally help make time pass more easily during the busiest time of all for our shelters.



Marty was the runt of the litter: his chest was abnormally narrow but tests showed his heart was working normally.

One of the Sydney Shelter's large network of foster carers was called upon to look after the kittens until they were ready for new homes (in the past financial year, 542 foster carers have looked after 3,523 animals).

However, the foster carer noticed something else was wrong with Marty: he didn't seem to be able to see things

close to him, such as toys. Sydney clinic vets established that Marty had problems with his eyes and could only see objects far away.

Lucky for Marty, he had Ollie by his side.

After five months in foster

care, guided by specialists from the Sydney vet clinic, Ollie had grown into a confident and talkative older kitten, and a very special brother for Marty, who was a little bit shy. Ollie would always go out ahead of Marty to check everything was safe for him, and literally became his seeing eye cat. It became obvious that the pair had to be rehomed together.

It took some time to find someone who was willing to adopt them both and take on a kitten with special needs, but finally the two brothers were adopted from the Sydney Shelter by Monica Cooke.

"When I saw their photographs, my heart went out to them. To discover that one brother helped the other was the clincher. Here were beautiful little animals helping one another rather than disregarding the one in need. I wish more humans were like that," said Monica, who had recently lost her previous RSPCA cat after 13 vears together.
